

Terminator Nymph

Hook: Nymph Hook (2 xl) # 10 - # 6

Thread: 6/0 (black)

Bead: Gold Brass Bead

Weight: Lead Wire .020

Hackle: Neck Hackle(black)


Tail: Goose Biots (black)

Body: Chenille or Dubbing (black)


Flash: Holographic Mylar Tinsel

Tying Instructions

- 1. Slide the bead over the hook point and them wrap lead wire on the hook shank and slide it up into the back of the bead.
- Attach thread and secure the lead wire. Apply a tiny ball of dubbing at the back of the hook and then attach a goose biot fiber on either side of the dubbing ball.
- Attach a hackle feather by the tip. Remove the fuzz from the chenille and tie it in at the hook bend.
- 4. Wrap the chenille to the back of the bead and tie off.
- 5. Tie in the holographic Chenille so that a strand runs down each side of the fly body.
- 6. Hold the tinsel so that it runs down the side of the fly and then wrap the hackle forward in evenly spaced wraps to hold the tinsel in place. Continue to wrap the hackle to the front of the hook. Tie off and trim hackle.
- Dub a collar in front of the hackle and then tie off an trim the thread. Then trim the hackle down to make a brushy looking body.



Lead wire and a bead make this fly get down to the fish quickly.



A chenille body makes covering the body easy for this pattern.



You can substitute another color of chenille, peacock herl or dubbing in this pattern to imitate big stoneflies.



The holographic tinsel reflects light and catches the eye of fish seeking a meaty meal.



This fly uses large hackles that can be trimmed to shape. This is a good use of these less used hackles.



Notice the tapered body shape and the "in-the-round" style of this fly. Fishing this in deep turbulent runs can be very effective.
